Five plumbers work on Meeting House plumbing.


Much of our 89-year-old plumbing is being replaced, partly because some of it was insulated with asbestos and partly because it was getting very old and due to fail soon.

Two ironworkers apply finishing touches to the Lobby stairs.


Four roofers continue to work on flashings and downspouts on a very hot day.

A painter touches up, and two electricians install switches and plugs here and there.


Two plumbers install sinks and faucets in the kitchenette and the small Assembly Room bathroom.

New chairs arrive in the new Storage Room and are promptly deployed by members of the wedding.




The restoration of the Kitchen ceiling begins.
